The move was aimed at arranging for pizza for thousands of people living in homeless shelters

across the country.

The guests present for lunch or dinner ate pizzas sponsored by Dominos and listened to music played by talented musicians, A total of 15,000 pizza slices were donated during the event, which was funded by private donations.

Qurrat, who is also an artistic director, said: "Even in today's economic situation, it is so heartwarming to see the donations flooding in, all to make people happy with some pizza and music. The overwhelming support



really confirmed for me that social change is possible; that people from all backgrounds will come together to spread hope, joy and awareness."

That title is conferred upon someone who sponsors all the pizzas for one shelter. "We really wanted to be involved with the project," said Dipti. EyeBLINK also produces multicultural theaire, dance, and other special events. Chairperson Arif Kadwani hopes that the Pizza for the Hungry project, which began last year in five New York City shelters, will be extended to 20 states by next year.
